Deliveries anyone?

Welcome to our second issue of the Fairfield Bulletin and thanks to the many people who sent encouraging comments about our first edition.

Our big news is that Love Living Local has begun a study into homedeliveries from Fairfield shops.

We want to find out if there is enough resident support for a homedelivery service. We also want to know which businesses are interested in being involved.

Our research shows that most of the shoppers in Fairfield arrive by foot or by bike.

We also know that this shopping strip is a central part of local household life. Nearly 300 residents responded to our recent survey and of these, 30 per cent visit the shops daily, 48 per cent visit every few days, and a further 17 per cent shop here weekly.

About 38 per cent of respondents travel to the shops by car—we suspect that most of these trips are for weekly grocery shopping.

We reckon that if the centre had a reliable, inexpensive home-delivery service, the number of people driving to the shops would fall without affecting total shopper numbers.

We're also going to think laterally about the sorts of transport a delivery service might use—for example, could it be done by bicycles? The study will also explore various operating schedules, costs, coordinating with multiple traders and other issues.

Local Profile Newcomers, new ideas!



In Railway Place, downtown Fairfield, there's a little shop that's doing something unique in all Australia—Applebox DVD rental.

This is a shop you can 'be' in at home. On your computer, you can browse their DVD stock, see whether it's available and book it. You can search by all kinds of categories, just like you might search a library catalogue—sure beats standing in the middle of a video shop unable to find what you want.

Applebox is run by siblings Sarah and Simon Gilligan. 'We have computers in the shop for people to use, but about half our customers pre-book from home or work,' says Simon.

'We find that most of our customers walk or cycle here,' says Sarah. 'And we both ride to work—takes me about 7 minutes—so we're really loving living local.'

But what's an Applebox? Sarah laughs, 'Oh, it's a device used all the time in film-making. Essentially it's a strong nest of boxes that are used to prop up things, like the camera, furniture, Tom Cruise ...'

Applebox is open from 11 am weekdays, 10 am weekends.
Closes 10 pm daily.

Rapt in buses

'I can't tell you how excited I am by the new bus service!' says proprietor of Wrapped In It Rosalie Standley, displaying the latest timetable. 'We now have Sunday bus services—about every 40 minutes to Northcote and Regent—and services every day right through to 9.30 pm!'


Since 1995, Rosalie has caught the bus to her gift shop in Station Street. 'I love public transport because I get the chance to meet other travellers. I can do everything I want by travelling on trains and buses.'

Rosalie is one of Australia's leading professional gift wrappers—even an inexpensive child's toy is wrapped expertly as part of the service. She wants her shop to be

a place for everyone, 'where the creativity here, eases stress and feeds the soul'.

She's also relieved that 40 kmh speed restrictions are finally in place. 'We traders and the community worked towards this for years. The 20 kmh reduction in speed has made the strip much safer for everyone.'

'The people in this strip are family to me,' she smiles.'I come here every day to have a good time!'



Internationally Local

Living Streets is a charity campaigning to create better streets and public spaces for people on foot. Their work spans policy, research, lobbying and advice.



Its Walkability Project in outer London is based on the same ideas as our Love Living Local campaign—that is, to enable district centres to become the types of place people can walk to daily or weekly, for their goods and services. There are 156 district centres in London alone—imagine the impact of Love Living Local principles there!

Starting with four district centres in outer London, the Project will be guided by Community Street Audits, based on the belief that local people know their neighbourhoods better than anyone and are therefore the best placed to identify problems and suggest solutions.

At the time of writing, Living Streets is supporting Walk to School Week, which will involve about two million primary schoolers across the UK. This year's theme is to explore sounds they can hear en route to school. At the national launch in London, students will be walking to school playing instruments made from old car parts!

In another **time**

As far as we can tell, *The Fairfield Advertiser* was published during WW2. It was about the size of the Herald-Sun, but just four pages long, carrying local stories as well as advertisements for traders. Like this Bulletin, it was letterboxed free to residents in the Fairfield area.

Paul Michell, Darebin Librarian and local U3A member, found this ancient newsletter and has posted details of it into the Darebin Libraries Historical Encyclopedia, accessible through www.darebinlibraries.vic.gov.au.

At your service

'In 1961, my grandfather opened Cardamone's food store on Station Street, supplying Italian produce for local immigrants," says Belinda Pannunzio. 'It's still very much a family business, run by Mum (Marisa), Dad, and my sister and our partners. My brother helps out too—he loves cutting cheese to keep the 16 fridges fully stocked!"

While the shop still imports goods from Italy, the main delights are Marisa's produce. Many of the deli items are gluten-free and made on the premises. The shop is famed for its crunchy parmesan dressing (featured as a 'hidden treasure' in The Age), but it's the range of seasonal preserves, antipasto, biscuits, and daily breads their kitchen produces that makes this a very special place.

The family is also deeply committed to fund-raising for communities less fortunate. Through the

local Uniting Church, Cardamone's donates food monthly to refugee families, and is part of a community effort to raise funds for a school in Uganda. Their noticeboard in the deli lists upcoming events you can support (see What's On, page 4).

Cardomone's also offers free home-delivery to local residents.
